

Stage 1 Science and Technology – Living World

Can you find me?

Students investigate the variety of living things that call Brewongle home by collecting data on living things, analysing their features, making an observational drawing and learning about habitats and their importance to all living things.

Maximum 5 classes per day.

Scientific inquiry questions

- What are the external features of living things?
- How can we improve a local environment to encourage living things to thrive?

Activities:

Bug camouflage hide and seek: Students work in pairs to find a suitable habitat for a giant toy bug.

Microhabitats and tiny bugs: Students conduct tree shakes to collect and identify a variety of bugs.

Bug analysis and guided insect drawing: Students analyse a variety of bugs and complete a guided drawing of a beetle.

Muruduwin: The Blue Wren: Students learn the story of how the Blue Wren (Muruduwin) got his colours.

Birdwatch walk with binoculars: Students search for birds around the site with binoculars.
